B. Executive Summary, Project Purpose and Benefits

Essay Question

Executive Summary of the proposed project:

Nationally, Arkansas ranks 46th in percentage of households with broadband access, and over half of the state's counties reside in the Mississippi Delta, the most distressed area of the nation. By virtually every indicator, including economic growth, education, and health, the Arkansas citizenry is one of the nation's most vulnerable populations. Exacerbating these facts, Arkansas' healthcare, higher education, public safety, and research entities suffer from insufficient broadband speed and equipment to deliver broadband applications needed to support Arkansas' citizens.

The combination is devastating. The benefits of telemedicine (e.g. interactive video clinical consultations, health information exchange, etc.) are unavailable to a significant number of facilities in Arkansas. Use of dial-up, dropped video calls, distorted or jittery video, and few, if any, publicly accessible computers are just some of the problems identified by Arkansas' healthcare facilities. Public safety entities utilize a disjointed emergency transportation system and a trauma network that lacks the resources needed to enable a regional system of emergency care. These public safety systems, which serve a state with the nation's third worst ranking in early deaths, function independently and lack interagency communication. In education, a fiber network currently serves the state's four-year universities and fosters collaboration in distance learning, online courses, and research studies, yet 58,000 students and 50,000 workforce trainees attending the state's two-year colleges lack connectivity to this network. and other research entities lack the broadband equipment to extend distance and online education to their communities, leaving consumers without access to applications aimed at improving their health, job skills, and well-being.

In response, the project will integrate isolated community anchor networks to expand the broadband capabilities and geographic reach of the Arkansas Telehealth Oversight & Management (ATOM) Network—a group of community anchor institutions with limited bandwidth and equipment that offer healthcare, higher education, public safety, and research services—and the Arkansas Research & Education Optical Network (AREON), the state’s only public-owned fiber optic network currently serving four-year universities. While the two networks serve as the foundations for this proposal, their full potential has not yet been achieved. For the ATOM Network, the project will substantially upgrade broadband services and/or equipment and upgrade over 100 new network sites to create a comprehensive statewide network of 441 community anchor institutions. For AREON, the project will expand the network’s fiber connectivity to reach all 22 state-supported two-year colleges. The ATOM Network will integrate with AREON by sharing fiber connectivity. All partners will provide public Internet connectivity to their consumers. Additionally, this project will permit high-speed delivery and transmission of the following broadband benefits at the 474 “integrated network” sites:

HEALTHCARE

- *Clinical telemedicine patient and provider consultations, and scientific research opportunities via real-time video
- *Electronic health information exchange of patient information
- *Distance education for real-time, interactive video learning and training
- *Home healthcare through handheld broadband devices
- *Research and educational materials available through healthcare colleges and schools
- *Insurance payment reimbursement for billable services delivered over interactive video

HIGHER EDUCATION

- *Fiber connectivity at all of the state’s 22 state-supported two-year colleges
- *Interconnectivity between two-year colleges and four-year universities through fiber, allowing distance education and research collaboration

*Improved continuity of emergency systems by connecting Arkansas’ bioterrorism network, trauma network, and a metropolitan ambulance service

RESEARCH

*Interactive video equipment in public libraries to promote participation in consumer health/academic distance education and support groups

The project will serve 118 middle mile service areas in a vast proposed funded service area encompassing:

- *Every county in the state (75)
- *Every economically distressed county in the state (69)
- *Every county in Arkansas within the Mississippi Delta, the most distressed area of the country (42)
- *Every medically underserved county in the state (73)
- *135 communities

The project passes 474 community anchor institutions including:

- *Every acute care hospital, county health clinic, and center on aging
- *Every four-year university and two-year college
- *All state human development centers
- *A majority of federally qualified community health centers
- *A majority of mental health clinics and home health agencies
- *The state’s only academic medical center
- *The state’s only publicly owned fiber optic network
- *The state’s only bioterrorism network
- *The state’s only trauma network
- *Eight public libraries
- *An ambulance service
- *Other clinics, centers, and educational units

The existing ATOM Network and AREON governance bodies will oversee this project, with the state’s academic medical center providing centralized network management.

The upgraded ATOM Network will integrate with AREON in a “hub-and-spoke” system that ensures dedicated healthcare, higher education, public safety, and research activities, freeing

existing circuits for public Internet use. Hubs and spokes will receive bandwidth upgrades, interactive video equipment, and/or public computers based on their needs.

*Primary Hubs represent 48 sites serving large numbers of end-users that will connect to a statewide fiber network for upgrades of 100 Mbps+, enabling simultaneous management of up to 40 broadband transmissions, including distance education or clinical video conferencing, imaging transfers, record transfers, remote monitoring, and health information exchange.

*Secondary Spokes represent 74 regional sites upgraded to 10 Mbps at 59 sites and 20 Mbps at 15 sites via dedicated point-to-point connections providing up to 15 distance education or clinical video conferences, imaging transfers, record transfers, and remote monitoring.

*Tertiary Spokes represent 352 sites serving primarily rural areas that will receive upgrades or new lines of 1.5 Mbps at 154 locations, which enables one simultaneous distance education or clinical video conference, image transfer, and record transfer. All tertiary spokes will receive equipment upgrades.

This solution will not compete with Internet Service Providers but rather contract with ISPs to provide network services.

As applicant, the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) is the state's only academic medical center and is an ATOM Network partner. Offering 19 years expertise in creating, launching, and sustaining its 60-site Arkansas broadband healthcare network, UAMS oversees 483 hours of interactive video daily and is the centralized management and scheduling service to the state's healthcare broadband activities. ATOM Network partners also manage the state's bioterrorism and trauma networks, constructed the state's home health program, and other efforts. UAMS will grant a subaward to AREON to manage fiber construction and connectivity at two-year colleges. As creator of the state's only publicly owned fiber optic network, AREON currently oversees 1,455 miles of fiber backbone and 40 miles of lateral fiber serving 11 four-year universities, enabling limitless possibilities in distance education and research collaboration.

The project will serve 474 anchor subscribers (total number of partners), collectively serving 2,855,390 end-user subscribers (total population of Arkansas).

The project will create 1,110 job-years, 66 direct job-years, 645 indirect job-years, and 400 induced job-years, a projection utilizing “Estimates of Job Creation” provided by the Council of Economic Advisors. Also, 129,858 jobs will be sustained by providing the expansion of healthcare workers’, educators’, and others’ roles through new broadband applications.

The project will meet all non-discrimination and interconnection obligations by (i) fulfilling FCC principles to encourage broadband deployment and preserve/promote the open and interconnected nature of the public Internet; (ii) offering managed services using dedicated connections and security measures to protect patient rights, with no preference for applications or content; (iii) operating in transparency, with full disclosure to potential users on its and its associates’ websites; (iv) offering public Internet access at its sites through publicly accessible computers; and (v) selecting ISPs based on cost efficiency and discounted pricing for high-speed broadband.

The project requires \$102,464,237, with a 31% match of \$46,720,413.

Project purpose:

The purpose of the Arkansas Healthcare, Higher Education, Public Safety, & Research Integrated Broadband Initiative (the project) is to address a problem at 474 community anchor institutions: lack of bandwidth and broadband equipment needed to reliably provide interactive video, health information exchange, and teleconferencing for clinical consultations, distance education, emergency event response, and other broadband-supported applications that are core expectations in their respective fields.

Illustrating the problem and its solution, two project partners located in the same underserved, rural, economically distressed town offer real-life examples of how broadband can make all the difference to their community:

A two-year college serves 20,000 students providing 3 Mbps bandwidth to students, staff, and surrounding communities. Limited bandwidth and high Internet activity has prevented students from completing online courses and testing. Although equipment exists to share compressed video classes with other two-year colleges, the facility does not have the bandwidth to offer distance education. This partner remarks that the college’s rural nature and limited bandwidth hinders their ability to serve their community, but connection to a statewide broadband network

would enable them to attract more students and consumers by offering new educational opportunities. This project will provide a 3,233% increase in bandwidth to this two-year college.

A healthcare broadband network offers interactive video to a hospital in the same rural town through 1.5 Mbps bandwidth. Early one morning, an 89-year-old woman collapsed in her home, as the left side of her body went suddenly numb. After rushing her to the hospital, emergency staff connected her to a neurologist 145 miles away through interactive video, enabling a real-time stroke assessment that led to the doctor’s prompt stroke diagnosis and immediate administration of drugs that reduce stroke morbidity and mortality. Using broadband, this woman was saved from a “major stroke” and certain death. Just 24 hours later, the fully recovered woman called the intervention, “a little miracle.” This project will provide similar life-saving capabilities to healthcare facilities statewide that do not currently have these advantages.

As this rural community demonstrates, broadband can mean the difference between life and death.

As a solution, the project seeks to enhance, expand, and integrate two existing broadband networks that have not yet realized their full potential: the Arkansas Telehealth Oversight & Management (ATOM) Network and the Arkansas Research & Education Optical Network (AREON). While these networks reach some locations with limited bandwidth, equipment, or narrow geographic coverage, the project will significantly improve their collective capacities via:

- *Substantially upgraded bandwidth
- *New broadband equipment
- *Added network sites
- *Expansion of a fiber network

The healthcare-focused entities within the ATOM Network will integrate with the education-focused entities of AREON by sharing a statewide fiber optic network, bringing never-before-available, high-speed capacities to 474 healthcare, higher education, public safety, and research entities, thus responding to the needs of citizens whose health, education, safety, and well-being depend on community anchor institutions to offer seamless broadband connectivity. The “integrated network” meets all five BTOP statutory principles, as follows.

*The proposed funded service area is comprised of 40% underserved and 6% unserved middle mile service areas.

*The libraries, medical and healthcare providers, two-year colleges, four-year universities, other institutes of higher learning, and other community support organizations comprising the integrated network's 474 partners will receive broadband education, awareness, training, access, equipment, and individualized technical support through these project features:

- Needed bandwidth and equipment at 474 locations
- Access to public computers and Internet at 474 locations
- Centralized network management with individualized training and troubleshooting for 474 locations
- Leveraging of a BTOP Sustainable Adoption project with Arkansas' broadband mapping agency
- A range of broadband-enabled consortia offered through two-year colleges to train employees and students in health information technology
- Partners specializing in healthcare delivery, education, and services for children
- Broadband collaborations, applications developed, and lessons learned that can be replicated in other areas

* The integrated network will enhance broadband capabilities at an ambulance service, bioterrorism network, and trauma network through increased bandwidth and equipment to rapidly respond to public safety through interactive video communication and emergency preparedness. The project will allow public safety entities to easily interconnect with all the 474 partners.

* The integrated network will stimulate the demand for broadband, economic growth, and job creation. One study revealed teleconferencing helps hospitals realize at least \$145,000 in yearly savings. Another study found that without telehealth, 94% of patients would travel 70 miles or more for medical care, 84% miss one day of work, and 74% spend \$75-\$150 on additional family expenses. With interactive video clinical consultations, 92% of patients saved \$32 in fuel costs, 84% saved \$100 in wages, and 74% saved \$75-\$150 in family expenses per visit, a total savings of up to \$282 per visit. With a statewide per capita income 21% less than the national average, Arkansans could greatly benefit from such cost savings. One lawmaker found that broadband access in educational settings could directly affect and ultimately lower the cost of

college: online educational opportunities cost less than traditional classroom meetings due to lower costs of parking and utilities.

-Establishes a patient-centric Regional Health Record Network that connects all of the Northwest Arkansas hospitals and providers through a common electronic health record system

Each proposal depends on the use of broadband to facilitate its activities. Increased speeds and installation of equipment will empower these initiatives to manage more of their activities through the 474 partnering community anchor institutions. Forty-two counties within the proposed funded service area reside in the Mississippi Delta, under the care of the Delta Regional Authority. Grant proposals and governmental collaboration that strengthen the project will be pursued at every opportunity to affect greater efficiencies.

Fit with BTOP CCI Priorities:

1) The ATOM Network will integrate with AREON to deploy middle mile infrastructure that will offer substantially upgraded broadband service and/or broadband equipment to 474 community anchor institutions in Arkansas, which will receive needs-specific upgrades that substantially improve bandwidth offered at each institution. Based on the average speed available at each type of site, the following percentages illustrate the percent increase in bandwidth speed that will be provided through this project.

*Hub sites: 567% increase in bandwidth (Average existing bandwidth at hub sites: 15 Mbps; proposed upgraded bandwidth: 100 Mbps)

*Secondary sites (two classes of upgrade): A. 567% increase in bandwidth (Average existing bandwidth at these secondary sites 1.5 Mbps; proposed upgraded bandwidth: 10 Mbps); B. 53.8% increase in bandwidth (Average existing bandwidth at these secondary sites 13 Mbps; proposed upgraded bandwidth: 20 Mbps)

*Tertiary sites: 94.8% increase in bandwidth (Average existing bandwidth at tertiary sites: 768 kbps; proposed upgraded bandwidth: 1.5 Mbps).

The key organizations representing the 474 community anchor institutions comprising the integrated network have presented Letters of Support that express their demand and/or needs for the proposed upgraded services and equipment. Further, needs assessments have gathered data used to determine the upgrades and equipment needed to deploy the most effective, relevant middle mile broadband infrastructure, as proposed.

2) The project will deploy middle mile broadband infrastructure that incorporates a public-private partnership with 252 government, 204 private, 18 public, 12 for-profit, and 462 non-

profit community anchor institutions. Each partner has expressed demand and/or need for the proposed upgraded services and equipment. Letters of Support representative of these institutions have been provided.

3) The project will deploy middle mile broadband infrastructure in the proposed funded service area that includes 69 economically distressed counties. Only six counties within the proposed funded service area are considered non-distressed. Providing increased bandwidth and new equipment will allow community anchor institutions the resources needed to bolster growth in the distressed areas.

4) The project will deploy middle mile broadband infrastructure to all 22 two-year colleges in Arkansas, all of which have expressed a demand or indicated a need for or improved access to broadband service. Their support is documented through the provided Letters of Support. Two-year colleges will join the AREON fiber optic backbone, receiving substantially upgraded broadband services achieving 100 Mbps or greater to expand distance education and research opportunities to their students and surrounding communities.

5) The project will deploy middle mile broadband infrastructure to an ambulance service and the Arkansas' bioterrorism network, trauma network, and emergency management educational courses. The ambulance service will equip 10 ambulances with the bandwidth and equipment necessary to provide in-transit specialty care for emergencies through interactive video and monitoring made possible through broadband connectivity. Further, 51 medical healthcare provider sites within the project also act as public safety entities through the bioterrorism network and trauma networks, the only broadband-driven resources in the state designed to respond to catastrophic, bioterrorist, and other emergent events that affect the welfare of individuals and the public. The bioterrorism network encompasses 85 locations and will benefit from equipment to ease communication between the 474 community anchor institutions. The bioterrorist network utilizes a centralized command center to oversee the safety of all Arkansans. Arkansas is also home to a new public safety entity that will be comprised of integrated network sites: the Arkansas Trauma Communications Center. This statewide trauma center will utilize broadband at hospitals and Arkansas state health department sites to facilitate rapid access to trauma care in rural areas. The community anchor institutions participating in the trauma network are both medical healthcare providers and also public safety entities. As an added incentive, a four-year university in the integrated network offers bachelors- and masters-level degrees in emergency management and homeland security, programs that can exchange

interactive video education and coursework with public safety entities, offering students a unique perspective in public safety. Each of these public safety entities has expressed a demand or indicated a need for improved capabilities to broadband service, as detailed in the provided Letters of Support.

7) The project will deploy middle mile broadband infrastructure with a commitment of a non-federal match of \$46,720,413, which is 31% of the total eligible costs of this project. Each key organization has contributed toward the match. Documentation of their support has been collected through signed and dated letters provided to the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences.

Methodology used to estimate jobs:

With the advent of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, a necessity arose to quantify jobs created as a direct result of stimulus money. The federal government created figures for job years, or one job for one year, based on the stimulus money provided. According to the Council of Economic Advisors, three types of jobs can be determined from the federal method of calculation: direct jobs, indirect jobs, and induced jobs.

To determine total job-years for a project, the money requested is divided by \$92,136, as directed by the Council of Economic Advisors. Thirty-six percent of this total provides the number of induced jobs, and 64% of the total provides the number of direct and indirect jobs.

The project has employed the same method for estimating the job-years created, which resulted in the following projections:

- *1,110.5 total job-years created
- *399.78 job-years (36% of the total) are from induced effects
- *66 job-years are from direct jobs (based on 25 FTE's in the budget narrative for the 8 years of revenue and cost projection)
- *644.72 job-years are from indirect jobs (the amount required to bring the total direct/indirect job years to 64% of the total, as prescribed by the calculations)

Project Impact:

The following key points highlight how the project will impact the entire state of Arkansas.

- 1) The funded project will directly connect 474 community anchor institutions.

- 2) The completed network could reach 3,926 additional community anchor institutions as potential customers, detailed below.
- 3) Each of the 474 community anchor institutions (100%) have expressed interest in subscribing to the integrated network. Key organizations representing the 474 community anchor institutions have provided Letters of Support.

The purpose of the connections is to facilitate enhanced broadband services and applications at community anchor institutions, so end users and surrounding communities may reap the benefits. Substantially upgraded bandwidth and broadband equipment will enable community anchor institutions to facilitate the following enhanced broadband services and applications:

Clinical Consultations

- *Healthcare entities can collaborate to offer new services to their patients by conducting clinical consultations through interactive video, leveraging the expertise of specialists available through the ATOM Network sites.
- *Healthcare entities can support public safety entities by offering interactive video access to trauma, burn, cardiology, stroke, and other specialists found at the ATOM Network sites.
- *Healthcare entities may offer student healthcare and consultation at student health clinics at AREON fiber-connected higher education institutions.

Distance Education

- *Higher education institutions can collaborate to offer new courses to their students by sharing online courses and distance education through interactive video, leveraging educational resources available through AREON.
- *Healthcare entities in the upgraded ATOM Network can support higher education institutions connected to AREON by extending new medical education opportunities and coursework in interactive video and online courses to students, promoting the growth of healthcare professionals in Arkansas.
- *Public safety entities in the upgraded ATOM Network can support higher education institutions connected to AREON by offering distance education in CPR, emergency response, campus safety, and other first responder topics.

Research

- *Public libraries in the upgraded ATOM Network can offer their consumers new opportunities to participate in interactive video healthcare and academic education and research, tutoring, online

courses, support groups, and other broadband-enabled resources available through the upgraded ATOM Network and AREON universities and two-year colleges.

*Research efforts can unite all the integrated network partners by providing new, collaborative opportunities to conduct and participate in clinical trials; recruit diverse study participants, including health disparate, rural, and Mississippi Delta residents; and conduct studies through interactive video, online study participant communication, and other broadband applications.

Virtual Communication

* Virtual communication can unite all the integrated network partners by providing the capability to stream interactive video teleconferences at each site, allowing discussion of any topic at any time.

*Public safety entities, including the state’s bioterrorism, trauma, and ambulance networks, can seamlessly communicate over interactive video with other ATOM Network sites, providing a rapid response to public safety events.

For the purpose of this proposal, the “end user” is defined as the consumer who either visits or works at the 474 integrated network community anchor institutions.

End users who visit the 474 community anchor institutions will gain the abilities to:

*Receive distance education and online courses from the state’s two-year colleges, four-year universities, and partnering public libraries.

*Participate through interactive video in two-year college consortia groups focused on workforce training, allied health, Delta training and education, aerospace training, entrepreneurship training, and green manufacturing.

*Visit with distant doctors and specialists for clinical consultations through interactive video

*Share X-rays, CT scans, and other medical imaging with medical facilities, eliminating the need to repeat imaging at new medical facilities

*Share medical histories, lab results, and other medical information with medical facilities, eliminating the need to repeat histories and tests at new medical facilities

*Receive specialty medical diagnoses and recommendations for care in ambulances while in emergency transit

*Access public computers that reach the public Internet at their local community anchor institutions

* Participate in research studies and clinical trials through interactive video.

*Receive rapid notification and warnings of traumatic, bioterrorist, natural disaster, or other public events that threaten personal safety

End users who work for 474 community anchor institutions will gain the abilities to:

- *Offer consumers all the benefits listed above
- *Promote new and enhanced clinical services by connecting to specialists through interactive video
- *Share patient imaging and records with other network sites
- *Bill insurance companies for reimbursable services offered over interactive video
- *Offer consumers publicly accessible computers with access to the public Internet
- *Participate in continuing education and distance education as delivered through interactive video and online courses
- *Conduct and collaborate in research studies and clinical trials, enabling study participant virtual recruitment, study, and follow-up and access to study participants from certain geographic locations (e.g. rural, Delta, etc.) or who share common characteristics (e.g. mental health, chronic disease, etc.)
- *Rapidly communicate to other network sites in traumatic, bioterrorist, natural disaster, or other public events that threaten the safety of individuals and their communities

Arkansas' communities will gain the abilities to:

- *Create new job opportunities for residents through direct, indirect, and induced jobs
- *Bolster the economy in their local communities by offering access to new and enhanced broadband applications delivered at community anchor institutions. For example, a patient who would normally travel to a distant hospital for specialty care could benefit from seeking the same specialty care through interactive video at the community hospital. This patient, otherwise, would lose days at work and dedicate any remaining expendable income on travel needs including gasoline, hotels, and meals within other communities, drawing money away from the local economy. Moreover, the local hospital, clinic, etc. loses the business of that patient.
- *Attract new residents by promoting new broadband resources at local community anchor institutions. For example, a two-year college could attract more residents by promoting new applications like distance education and online education possibilities that help students enrich their educational experience.

The 474 community anchor institutions represented in the project are primarily non-profit businesses. The integrated network holds the potential for expansion to other community anchor

institutions in Arkansas, including 1,072 K-12 public schools, 29 charter schools, 305 private schools, 412 long-term care facilities, 758 provider clinics, 231 public libraries, 203 licensed ambulance services, 264 police departments, 575 fire departments, and 77 offices of emergency management. Partnership in the integrated network will extend all the benefits discussed above.

The project will extend increased business opportunities to third-party ISPs that seek to provide broadband services to the proposed funded service area through a competitive bid process. The following ISPs have explicitly expressed interest in the integrated network.

- *AT&T
- *Windstream
- *Rural Telecom Services
- *Century Link
- *Ritter Communications
- *CT&T

These ISP discussions were held in a meeting, without any formal declaration of intent. However, the Broadband Commission of Arkansas, with members of AT&T, South Arkansas Telephone Company, Suddenlink, Rural Telecom Solutions, Verizon, and Cox Cable, has provided a Letter of Support.

This project truly impacts the entire state of Arkansas, its citizens, businesses, and communities, with the 474 proposed connections this project will serve 2,855,390 Arkansans, the entire state population. With increased bandwidth and/or equipment in every county in Arkansas at a comprehensive range of community anchor institutions, every resident in Arkansas will be served through the proposed connections. The project will benefit residents in their daily lives, from their local hospital, public library, two-year college, ambulance service, community health clinic, mental health clinic, and any institutions found in the integrated network.

Vulnerable Populations:

The project's proposed funded service area represents a number of vulnerable populations. Since the proposed funded service area exclusively lies within the boundaries of Arkansas, statistics on vulnerable populations are presented on the state level. Several vulnerable populations are prevalent in Arkansas, including:

*Low income: 15.3 % in Arkansas compared to 13.2% in the U.S.

*Elderly: 14.3% in Arkansas compared to 12.8% in the U.S.

*Children (under 18): 24.6% in Arkansas compared to 24.3% in the U.S.

*Disabled: 17.4% in Arkansas compared to 12.1% in the U.S.

In addition, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services analyzed five vulnerable population indicators to determine community health statuses for Arkansas, finding the state had higher or equal percentages than the national average in four of those five indicators: no high school diploma, severe work disability, major depression, and recent drug use.

*No high school diploma: 24.7% Arkansas; 19.6% U.S.

*Severe work disability (per 1000 people): 111.7 Arkansas; 81.5 U.S.

*Major depression (age 18 or older having at least one depressive episode in 2005): 8.39% Arkansas; 7.65% U.S.

*Recent drug use (12 and older using illicit drugs in the past month): 6.69% Arkansas; 6.69% U.S.

Additionally, more than half of the counties comprising the proposed funded service area reside in the Mississippi Delta, the most distressed area of the nation. The Mississippi Delta, as defined by the Delta Regional Authority (DRA), is notably less populated, less educated, and less affluent than the rest of the nation. More than half of the proposed funded service area belongs to the Delta, an area marked by the following demographics:

*Population per square mile: 65.8% Delta; 82.8% U.S.

*Per capita income: \$25,426 Delta; \$31,472 U.S.

*Minorities as a percent of the total population: 34.2% Delta; 18.8% U.S.

*Percent of population age 65 or older: 12.7% Delta; 12% U.S.

*Percent of population with bachelor's degree: 17.2% Delta; 23.4% U.S.

The 42 Delta counties in the proposed funded service area lack universally accessible high-speed Internet service – more than 15% of DRA zip codes do not have a high-speed Internet service provider compared to 10% of non-DRA zip codes. Even when services are available, the lack of competing service providers and lower per capita incomes make the cost of broadband a major barrier. Making broadband available at community anchor institutions is essential to overcoming such barriers.

The 474 community anchor institutions comprising the upgraded ATOM Network and AREON exhibit a high degree of need for the substantially upgraded bandwidth and equipment, as documented through needs assessments and responses from partners regarding their limitations in broadband service and applications. As gathered from this needs assessment, the following comments exemplify common problems with the current bandwidth and equipment available to the community anchor institutions.

*A proposed primary hub location with a current 10 Mbps download-speed and serving 36,184 consumers with clinical services and health education stated it was suffering, “loss of connection or distortion due to bandwidth connections...[forcing users to] travel to another location or facility to use video conferencing equipment.” This hub location remarked the integrated network could help them “expand...faculty and student population ...[which] will require a significant increase in floor space, networking equipment, end user equipment, and more bandwidth.” This location will receive a 100 Mbps upgrade.

Other primary hub locations noted the following broadband limitations:

“Poor screen resolution and jittery video, dropped connections, inability to connect to remote site for teleconferences.”

“Current interactive video conferences must run at low speeds due to limited internet connectivity.”

“Temporary loss of service has affected our ability to care for patients to our best ability.”

“Teleconferences have been lost or lowered in quality due to service loss or overload.”

*A proposed secondary spoke location with a current 2.1 Mbps download-speed and serving 5,000 consumers through regional hospital services stated: “Consistently, we have VPN [virtual private network] drops to our remote clinics and to our remote radiology reading site.” Further, this same location noted the integrated network would enable them to “upload patient information to each other through the network without having specific VPN connectivity to each site, [which would] greatly simplify the communications required by ARRA. We could also have enough bandwidth to supply to remote access for patient and physician portals. We could also open the proxy for video transmissions, which we currently have to block because of bandwidth availability.” This location will receive a 20 Mbps upgrade.

“Slow EMR [electronic medical records] response to rural clinics from [hospitals] due to limited rural clinic broadband bandwidth.”

“We try to keep it [distance education] to a minimum to give more bandwidth to daily operations (remote electronic health records).”

“Unable to provide patient healthcare education services (videos, etc.) at rural clinics due to limited broadband availability at rural clinics.”

*A proposed tertiary spoke location with a current 456-kbps download speed and serving 2,600 consumers through mental health counseling stated: “[Our institution suffers the] inability to access live conferences, webinars, training (streaming), [due to] not enough download/upload speed for multiple users to access at any given time.” The same tertiary spoke location remarked that the integrated network will provide “valuable networking for the professional staff, and this would function as a secondary gain for consumers.” This location will receive a 1.5 Mbps upgrade.

Other tertiary locations noted the following broadband limitations:

“When streaming video the frames delivered are extremely choppy, locks up consistently, etc.”

“It is also reassuring to know that [through the integrated network] we can be connected/interconnected to the majority of major Hospitals throughout the State of Arkansas, for disaster drills, administrative meetings, etc.”

Across all community anchor institutions polled, one resounding barrier to improved broadband services was identified by respondents: available funding. Nearly half (47%) of all respondents identified this shortcoming. Other specified barriers included staff awareness of benefits of broadband, staff willingness to participate in new broadband applications, and the lack of broadband-enabled healthcare training. The project will provide the bandwidth, equipment, and deployment support needed to help overcome these identified barriers among Arkansas’ community anchor institutions.

The proposed funded service area is home to an estimated 62 Internet Service Providers (ISPs), each of which provides services to portions of Arkansas; however, no ISP provides services to the whole of the proposed funded service area. Connect Arkansas, the state’s designated broadband mapping agency, recently completed a study of the ISP coverage areas in Arkansas, revealing refined details regarding the current broadband infrastructure in the proposed funded

service area, as depicted on the provided maps of the underserved /unserved areas, which cover 40% and 6% respectively of the proposed funded service area.

Many of the ISPs serving Arkansas offer comparable services as those proposed within the project, and the project will contract with ISPs to provide the broadband services needed at reasonable costs. Therefore, ISPs in the proposed funded service area have the capabilities to offer greater bandwidth speeds to community anchor institutions, but to date, there has been a failure in providing affordable, high-bandwidth services to community anchors at prices that these institutions can afford on a recurring basis. Existing comparable services are, more than often, outside the budgets of the community anchor sites, most of which are non-profits, making increased bandwidth offered at the retail price a difficult cost to assume. To help drive prices down and make broadband access more affordably sustainable after the BTOP CCI project period, a competitive bid process will invite ISPs to compete for the business of the community anchor institutions that comprise the integrated network. The project will utilize the services of ISPs to deploy a leased circuit design that increases bandwidth and integrates the ATOM Network with AREON. A number of ISPs will be employed to reach all the geographically dispersed ATOM Network sites within the proposed funded service area. As such, the project will allow ISPs to compete through a bid process to reach the community anchor institutions, cultivating a rich competitive landscape where ISPs plan connectivity with special consideration to costs and efficiency.

As such, the project will not compete for Internet services offered by ISPs serving the state. Instead, the project will create the infrastructure and provide the centralized project management necessary to make such a vast community anchor institution integrated network possible within the timeframe of the grant period. ISPs will compete through a bid process to offer increased bandwidth to the middle mile service areas comprising the proposed funded service area, giving an opportunity for multiple ISPs to gain new customers and income. In effect, the following added benefits will be afforded to the 474 community anchor institutions and any future expansions of the integrated network:

- *Broadband affordability to community anchor institutions
- *New opportunities for income to ISPs
- *Centralized project management for the entire integrated network during the project period

These added values come in addition to the near limitless benefits community anchor institutions themselves have recognized, including increased ability to communicate with other institutions, provisions of education and services, and improved services to consumers with new, needed broadband applications.

The current broadband infrastructure serving community anchor institutions in Arkansas is fragmented and is managed and operated by separate partners. Both ATOM Network and AREON have substantial needs in increasing bandwidth and/or their geographic reach to more community anchor institutions.

The Arkansas Research and Education Optical Network (AREON) currently offers a fiber backbone spanning major cities in the proposed funded service area across 1,455 miles of fiber backbone and 40 miles of lateral fiber that connects Arkansas' four-year universities to facilitate distance learning, research, and other broadband applications for Arkansas' students. AREON seeks to expand its network reach to include two-year colleges.

The ATOM Network is currently a collection of community anchor institutions with limited bandwidth. Comprising the ATOM Network are the UAMS, Baptist Health, Department of Health, Department of Human Services, St. Vincent's, and UAMS Co-Sig Networks, detailed below:

*UAMS: (Current 1.5 Mbps-Fiber) Operates a telehealth network consisting of 60 sites statewide to exchange interactive video in all fields of medicine and healthcare education.

*Baptist Health Hospital: (Current 1.5-100 Mbps) Operates a 38-site hospital and clinical network in conjunction with the Home Care Association of Arkansas, for emergency care, healthcare education, therapy, and home health services.

*Arkansas Department of Health: (Current 1.5 Mbps) Operates the state's bioterrorism network, trauma network, and hospital network located at 85 acute care hospitals for the management of public safety, emergency preparedness, and clinical communication.

*The Department of Human Services: (Current 1.5 Mbps) Operates a 6-site Human Development Center Network, which provides services for persons with developmental disabilities.

*St. Vincent’s Health System: (Current 1.5 - 45 Mbps) Operates an 11-site affiliated hospital and clinic network.

As described above, the current broadband infrastructure only serves a portion of Arkansas’ larger community anchor institutions, through a fragmented approach, broken into a number of smaller networks operated by separate partners. With such fragmentation being the reality of Arkansas’ current broadband situation, the ATOM Network will add sites and integrate with AREON fiber connectivity to create a comprehensive network that leverages fiber-grade speed at sites that serve a large number of consumers and upgrades the limited bandwidth currently available at community anchors serving regional, rural, and underserved areas. The integrated and upgraded network will create a complementary infrastructure that allows ease in communication among the 474 partners, each committed to the healthcare, higher education, public safety, and research needs of all Arkansans.

The proposed funded service area has few urban areas, as is reflective of Arkansas’ primarily rural nature, but among these urban locations, broadband coverage is more pronounced. Even still, some areas within urban locations do not have broadband access. Rural locations, however, have substantially limited and isolated broadband access. The proposed funded service area can also be analyzed through state-level economic data. Arkansas’ current economic situation ranks below most national averages for economic standing. For instance, according to the US Census Bureau, only 61.1% of Arkansans are in the labor force, compared to the national average of 65.2%. Statewide, only 18.8% have graduated with bachelors degrees, in comparison to the nationwide percentage of 27.4. Reflecting that shortcoming, the amount of employed persons in management or professional positions falls five percentage points below the national average, and the median household income in Arkansas is \$39,127 compared to the U.S. average of \$52,175. Finally, nearly a third more people in the state live at or below the poverty level than the rest of the country.

Methodology for Area Status:

Arkansas' designated broadband assessment and mapping entity provided the source data necessary to determine the unserved and underserved status of the project's middle mile service areas. This entity, Connect Arkansas, received BTOP Round 1 funding to map the broadband services of Arkansas. Connect Arkansas provided maps identifying every unserved and underserved census block in Arkansas, along with data files indicating the Federal Information Processing Standard codes, census block counties, total households, and population of all Arkansas areas that met unserved and underserved qualifications. To create such maps, staff members at Connect Arkansas utilized their preexisting statewide broadband availability data and the definitions delineated by NTIA to generate maps and data files that identified unserved and underserved areas in Arkansas according to the BTOP definitions. Specifically, Connect Arkansas determined underserved status using qualifications 1 (percentage of households with access) and 2 (advertised transmission speeds) for underserved census blocks. Connect Arkansas determined unserved and underserved status on Internet Service Providers (ISP) coverage data directly obtained from providers in 2008. Connect Arkansas lacks access to broadband service provider subscriber data, thus the third qualification of underserved could not be determined.

Connect Arkansas met with the applicant to discuss creation of the project maps. Connect Arkansas maps and data serve as base images for the project maps. Thus, this project directly employs the exact images provided by the statewide broadband mapping entity to depict unserved and underserved areas within the proposed funded service area and middle mile service areas. Connect Arkansas also assisted in formalizing a strategy to calculate the percentage of unserved and underserved areas within the proposed funded service area. Utilizing the original source files, mapping software, and visual assessment of the overlay of middle mile service areas on these maps, Connect Arkansas determined 40% of the proposed funded service area classifies as “underserved” and 6% of areas qualify as “unserved.”

This project also benefits from an alliance with Connect Arkansas, which has provided a Letter of Support for this project. Moreover, the Executive Director of the Arkansas Association of Two-Year Colleges, whom serves as a key partner in this project, is also the Vice Chair of the Connect Arkansas Board. These alliances ensure broadband assessment, mapping, and collaboration with the state’s designated broadband mapping agency will support the deployment of this project.

Description of Network Openness:

*The project will ensure the proposed design adheres to FCC Broadband Policy Statement principles. Both the ATOM Network and AREON fulfill the FCC’s principles to encourage broadband deployment and preserve and promote the open and interconnected nature of the public Internet.

*The project will show no favoritism for lawful Internet applications or content, offering managed services such as telemedicine, public safety communications, and distance learning using private connections and security measures that protect the rights of end users; however, the traverse of public Internet will not favor applications or content. Contracted Internet Service Providers (ISPs) will agree to not give preferential treatment to certain applications and content providers.

K. Project Readiness

BTOP Organizational Readiness

As proposed, the project can start immediately upon receiving BTOP CCI funding, as the key partners are poised to conduct the work necessary to begin offering broadband benefits to their end users. Several key factors constitute organizational readiness:

* **Organizational Expertise:** The ATOM Network and AREON offer broadband expertise. The ATOM Network partnership combines the majority of Arkansas’ healthcare, public safety, and research entities, several with hands-on experience operating broadband networks. UAMS offers 19 years experience in creating and sustaining its broadband network and provides centralized network management to the state’s healthcare broadband activities. UAMS will leverage these skills to manage the upgraded ATOM Network. Since 2005, AREON has been building the state’s only publicly owned fiber optic network, managing expansions built out in phases to acquire fiber resources for the backbone to connect to Internet2 and the National LambdaRail, and establishing its presence at Arkansas’ four-year universities.

* **Established Efforts:** While the ATOM Network and AREON have laid the foundation for broadband networks in Arkansas, current connection speeds are insufficient for needed broadband applications. The integrated network will combine existing networks and add new sites to facilitate communication between currently isolated partners. A number of ATOM Network members worked collaboratively to receive FCC Rural Health Care Pilot Program approval to receive 1.5 Mbps broadband lines at 316 sites. While that FCC funding is forthcoming, this project leverages the FCC resources and significantly advances the network in number of partners, bandwidth capabilities, and equipment availability. Moreover, AREON currently manages a dark fiber network at 11 four-year universities.

* **Practicing Governance:** The ATOM Network and AREON are represented by existing governance bodies that will provide leadership to implement, operate, and manage the project. Representative members meet to discuss the compliance, direction, and progress of the state’s current broadband efforts. These governance bodies will direct the project openly and

transparently, encouraging participation from all the 474 community anchor institutions that comprise this project.

*Billing/Customer Care: UAMS offers skills in federal grant management through a staff of accountants and a grants office that oversee grant accountability and compliance. UAMS accountants also process billing for broadband services and telehealth services. UAMS provides a 24/7 customer care hotline to troubleshoot and schedule interactive video connections as part of network management. As subgrant recipient, AREON will provide accounting oversight to the proposed fiber connectivity to the state’s two-year colleges. AREON is skilled in the administration and management of vast, statewide fiber construction projects.

Construction and Vendor Contracts

*Internet Service Providers (ISP): The project will secure lease agreements through a competitive bid process with ISPs to provide proposed broadband services. AREON, being a research and education backbone, does not compete with local loop providers for commercial and private business. Instead, the project will follow approved State purchasing guidelines that ensure all eligible bidders the opportunity to compete for local loop contracts, reflecting the need for both leased circuits and shared access for local loop segments. Seven ISPs have met with the applicant to discuss their potential for providing broadband services to the project, which will depend on “last mile” public-private partnerships to provide broadband service.

*End-user Equipment: These vendors will respond to a bid process to provide the equipment necessary to enhance broadband applications in the integrated network, on-site setup, and testing of new equipment and supplies.

*Fiber Construction: AREON will issue a competitive bid process to procure existing dark fiber and/or select construction and engineering vendors to design and construct the fiber expansion to the two-year colleges. Public-private partnerships between AREON and providers are essential to the success of the project. AREON has experience contracting with construction and engineering vendors. The selected construction vendors will lay conduits and fiber to two-year colleges.

UAMS will provide overall management to the upgraded ATOM Network, while AREON will provide overall management of the fiber construction to reach two-year colleges. The UAMS customer base is served at the academic medical center’s hospital and the 60 community anchor institutions connected to its broadband network. The academic medical center serves 371,994 outpatients, 19,582 inpatients, 12,353 surgical cases, and 43,510 emergency visits annually. The 60 sites participating in the UAMS broadband network collectively serve over 1,000,000 customers annually. More specifically, approximately 21,000 customers are served through the broadband network and over 400 continuing education teleconferences welcome over 1700 consumers annually through UAMS. The AREON customer base is found at the state’s four-year universities, reaching 11 universities with a total enrollment of 76,356 students. Through this project, AREON will connect college communications with increased bandwidth, institutions that reach over 100,000 students.

A vast majority of the integrated network customers will originate from rural, medically underserved, poverty-saturated areas, with more than half of its customers in the Mississippi Delta, an area with a predominant concentration of minorities. Further, 63 of Arkansas’ 75 counties are considered non-metropolitan and consequently rural, and 48% of Arkansans are considered rural, compared to the nation, where only 21% are considered rural.

Licenses, Regulatory Approvals and Agreements

This project’s licensing and regulatory approvals will be the responsibility of the Internet Service Providers (ISPs) who will provide the proposed broadband services. These licenses and regulatory approvals are expected to include any FCC authorizations, state authorizations, and other typical agreements that must be secured by ISPs to participate in such broadband activities. Since many of Arkansas’ broadband telecommunications companies are well-established carriers, it is anticipated many of the contractual vendors will have experience in seeking and adhering to these licenses and regulatory procedures. UAMS will contract with ISPs to install the proposed leased circuits to community anchor institutions. In collecting these contractual bids, responders will specify their required and secured licenses and regulations to ensure the respondent can offer timely and compliant service.

In addition to these licenses and approvals, the expansion of AREON fiber to two-year colleges will require city franchise and easement agreements where fiber builds are required. Although AREON is a non-profit entity, many cities require the organization to initially acquire licenses, agreements, and approvals. AREON has established agreements with many cities in Arkansas in

Project Description

For all portions of the network where fiber optic cable will be constructed, the following applies. Typical construction in rural areas along intercity highway rights-of-way will be predominantly done via cable plow. In locations where surface features do not accommodate plowing, cable will be placed using underground boring. Crossings of smaller streams or rivers will also be done by boring, but bridge attachments of conduit-encased fiber will be necessary for larger bodies of water for which boring is impractical or too expensive. Most construction within cities and campuses will be done via underground boring.

For all sites receiving electronic equipment, including connected campuses and fiber amplification sites, a prefabricated fiber hut large enough to house several racks of equipment and integrated air conditioning and generator backup is planned. The intercity fiber being constructed will extend to these huts, and additional lateral fiber will be constructed into each campus to its network demarcation point. A few campuses with existing data centers with sufficient space, cooling, generator backup, and security to support the optical equipment node will not receive prefabricated fiber huts nor intercity fiber. With the exception of the installation of two-post racks or equipment cabinets to house the optical equipment and the construction of the fiber into the building, no other building renovations or construction is planned or anticipated.

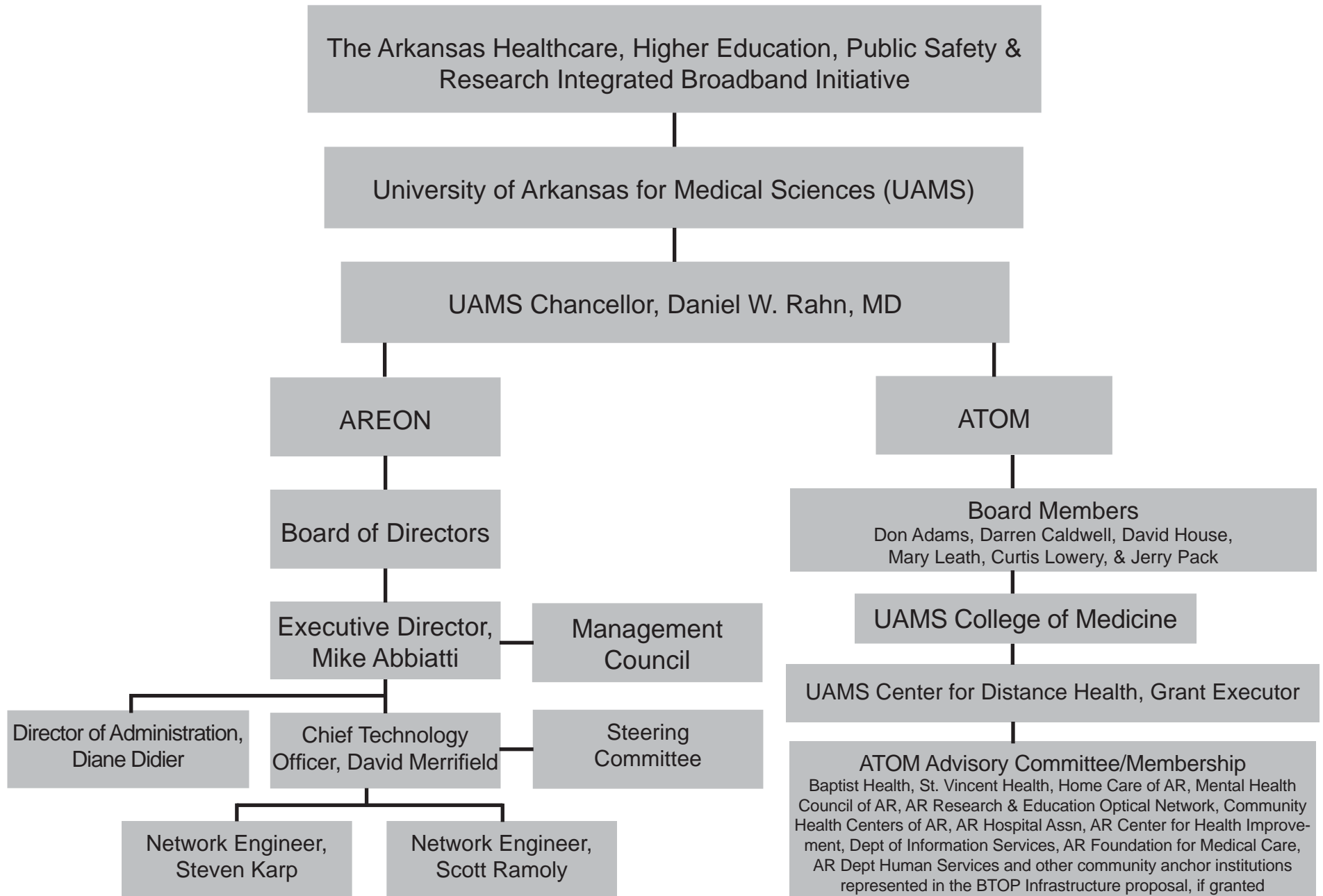

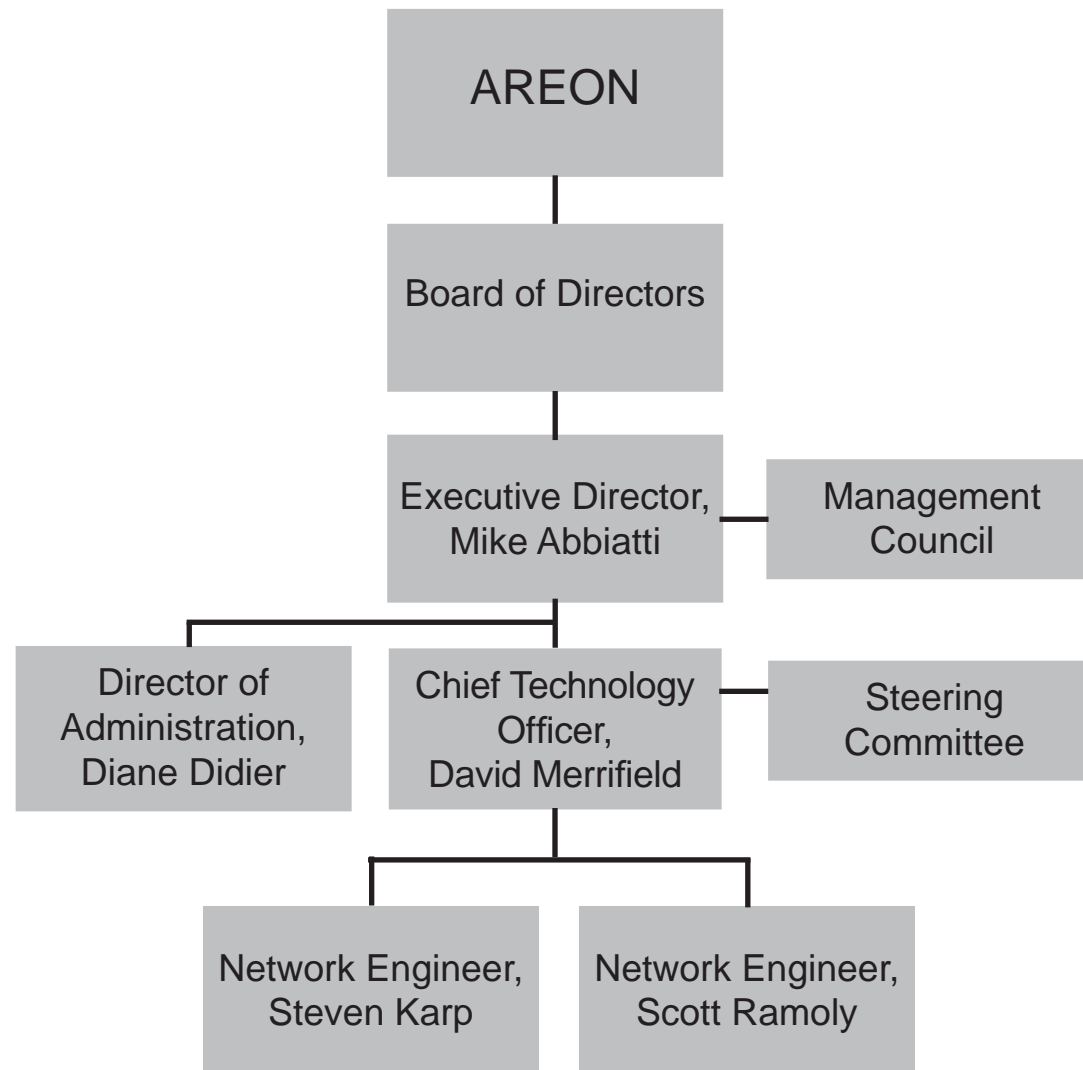

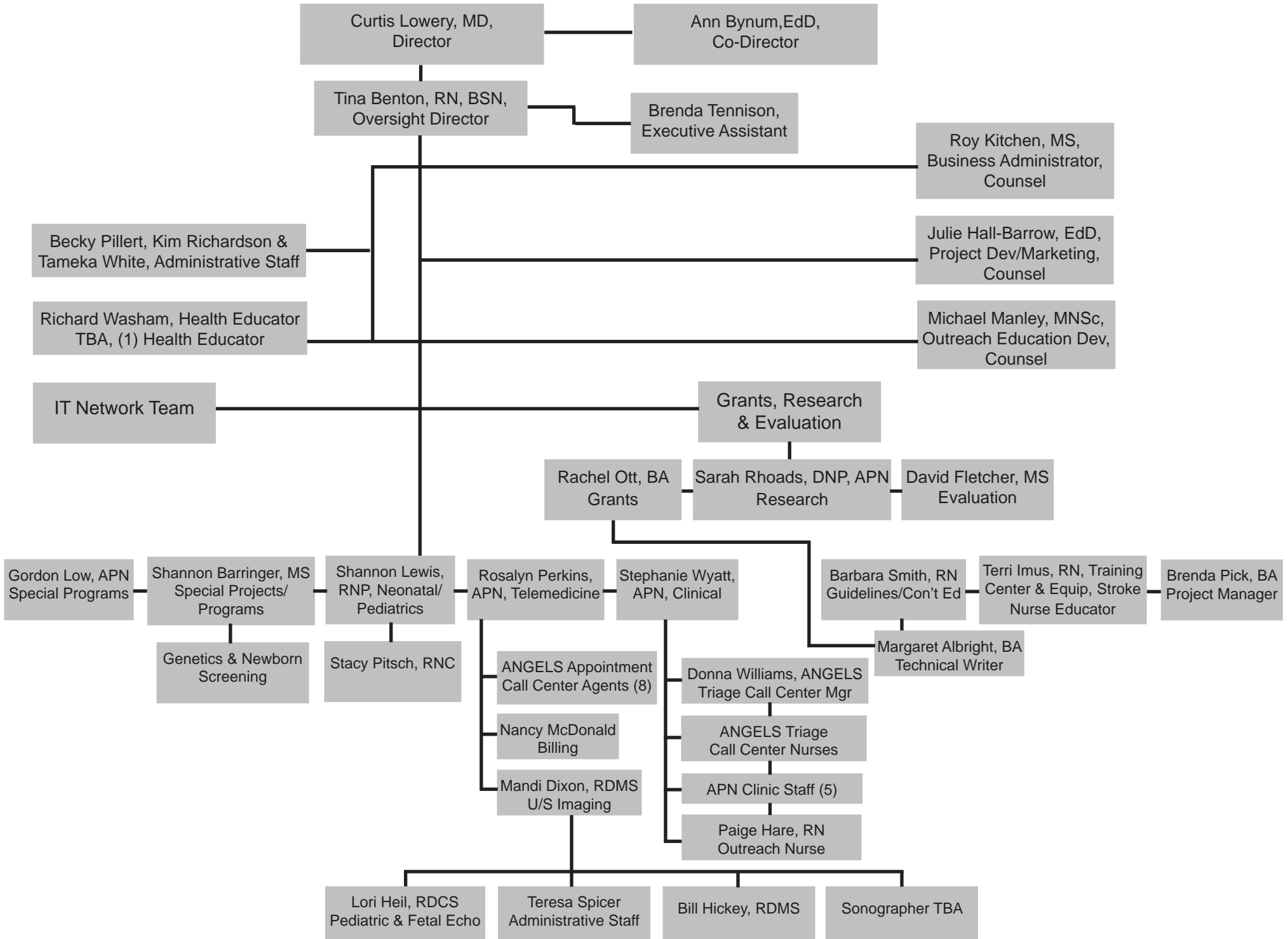

These subscriber estimates are based solely on community anchor subscribers, as this middle mile network will use Internet Service Providers selected through a competitive bid process to provide broadband services to community anchor institutions.

In Years 1, 2, and 3: All community anchor institutions are included at the time they receive their bandwidth and/or equipment from this project.

Tertiary Sites

Years 4-8:

By building a statewide comprehensive network for healthcare, higher education, public safety, and research, this project anticipates new subscribers to join the network for shared applications and broadband benefits.

Year 4, Quarter 4:

The UAMS Centers on Aging and the UAMS Center for Distance Health plan to offer interactive video services to nursing home and long-term care facilities across Arkansas near this estimated time. The expansion of this network is predicted to reach half of the nursing home and long-term care facilities in Arkansas (412 total, 206 predicted subscribers). Since these institutions are often privately owned, the project estimates to recruit half of these facilities by this time.

Year 6, Quarter 4:

The Arkansas K-12 public school system has expressed past interest in joining this network for healthcare education and in-school healthcare. It is estimated the entire statewide school system will join the network at one time, with a predicted timeline of Year 6, Quarter 4. The Arkansas K-12 public school system operates on the VNet, a statewide broadband network that provides T1 (1.5 Mbps) connectivity to every school in Arkansas. There are 1,072 K-12 schools in Arkansas.
